The commitment demonstrated by our young learners in honing their penmanship skills was truly commendable. The competition not only celebrated the aesthetic aspect of writing but also emphasised the importance of preserving and cherishing the rich cultural heritage embodied in the Chinese Language.



Our P3 to P6 students had the opportunity to participate in traditional Chinese puzzles and games, such as "Kong Ming Lock 孔明锁 ", "Nine Linked Rings 九连环 " and "Hua Rong Dao 华容道 ". These activities not only encouraged critical thinking and problem-solving but also immersed our students in the cultural richness of their Chinese Language.

Malay Language



The Primary 1 students had a memorable time participating in a kite -making activity. They embraced the essence of Malay culture by drawing beautiful batik designs on their kites. With their creative skills, they added vibrant colours to their kites, resulting in a colourful display of artistry and cultural appreciation.

In line with the theme, Primary 2 students delved into the traditional Malay game of "gasing" (spinning tops). Each student received a gasing and had the opportunity to design and play with it, allowing them to experience this cultural activity firsthand.















Primary 3 students engaged in a range of Malay traditional games, including "kelereng", "tarik upih", "bola lubang" and "gasing". They actively participated in these traditional games, fostering teamwork, coordination, and an appreciation for our cultural heritage. The students left with big smiles, proud of their heritage, and excited to have learned new skills.

Primary 4 students discover the art of *Seni Khat*, or Malay calligraphy, as we delve into its rich history and aesthetic beauty. Students explored samples of calligraphy, learn to identify characters and pronounce their sounds, and engage in hands-on practice of writing *Jawi*. Each student was given a pouch and fabric markers to trace their names in *Jawi*, allowing for personalization and creativity.









Primary 5 students, explored the culinary heritage of the Malay community. They discovered the traditional dish called "nasi ambeng" and learned about the various Malay herbs used in its preparation. The highlight of this activity was the opportunity to enjoy a delicious meal of "nasi ambeng" served on a large tray, shared amongst students, promoting cultural unity and shared experiences.



To deepen their understanding of Malay culture, Primary 6 students embarked on a project to learn and create a mini Malay traditional house. They worked diligently to construct these models, showcasing their craftsmanship and knowledge of traditional architectural elements.




